Agenda Specifics

The Board of Harbor Commissioners adopted the District's Preliminary Budgets for Operating, Capital Outlay and Debt Service on May 22, 2017 per Section 6093.1 of the California Harbor & Navigation code. Since the adoption, a Notice of Public Hearing to be held June 26, 2017 regarding these budgets was posted in the local Ventura County Star more than 30 days prior as required by Harbors & Navigation.

The District's Deputy Executive Director, CFO/CAO shall present the final version of the FY 2017-2018 budgets highlighting any changes since the May 22nd adoption.

The District is presenting a balanced Operating Budget for FY 2017-2018. Each item in the Capital Outlay budget shall return to the Board for final approval on amounts over \$25,000. The Debt Schedule Budget reflects a Debt Service Ratio of 224.33% which more than meets the Bond Covenants requirement of 125%, a difference of 99.33% in the District's favor.

RESOLUTION NO. 11661176

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF HARBOR COMMISSIONERS OF THE OXNARD HARBOR DISTRICT ESTABLISHING EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS FOR ALL NON-MOU EMPLOYEES

To the extent that any provision of this Resolution is inconsistent or in conflict with the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act (PEMHCA) with respect to employees and annuitants participating in medical plans approved and maintained by the Board of Administration of <u>CalPERS</u>, the provisions of PEMHCA are controlling.

1. <u>CalPERS</u>_<u>RETIREMENT BENEFITS</u>

A. CalPERS Pension Benefits. The District retains the right to modify in the future the benefits provided herein, including, but not limited to, the right to increase or decrease the amount to be paid by the District. Except as otherwise provided in a Memorandum of Understanding between the District and the SEIU Local 721, tThe District shall currently provide benefits for its Non-MOU employees in the following manner;

The District participates in the California Public Employees Retirement System hereinafter called CalPERS. The District has adopted:

- A. Social Security Coverage (Effective 01/01/51)
- B. § 20037 Final Compensation Three Years (Effective 12/01/73)
- C. § 20055 Prior Service Credit (Effective 12/01/73)
- **D.** § 21329 2% Annual COLA Limitations on Adjustments (Effective 12/01/73)
- E. § 20965 Credit for Unused Sick Leave (Effective 08/01/85)
- F. § 21427 Improved Non-Industrial Disability Allowance (Effective 12/10/96)
- **G.** §21548 Pre-Retirement Optional Settlement 2 Death Benefit (Effective 12110/96)
- H. §21354 2% at Age 55 Retirement Benefit Formula (Effective 2/11/97)
- I. §21551 Benefits Payable to Surviving Spouse, Restoration, Continuation Upon Remarriage-
- J. § 21024 Military Service Credit as Public Service (Effective 01/09/01)
- K. § 21354.4 2.5% at Age 55 Retirement Benefit Formula (Effective 11/19/02)

The 2.5% at Age 55 (§ 21354.4) Benefit Formula is applicable to employees retiring after November 19, 2002 but hired before January 1, 2013 and employees hired on or after January 1, 2013 that are considered "Classic" members by <u>CalPERS</u>. Employees hired on or after January 1, 2013 that are considered "New Members" by <u>CalPERS</u> are subject to the 2.0% at Age 62 Benefit Formula per the California Public Employees' Pension Reform Act (PEPRA).

For Employees that are considered "Classic" members by <u>CalPERS</u>, the District will pay one hundred percent (100%) of all eligible employees' normal member contributions to <u>CalPERS</u> as well as the employer's contribution. For Employees that are considered "New Members" by <u>CalPERS</u>, the Employee will pay one hundred percent (100%) of all their eligible Employee's contribution to <u>CalPERS</u> as required under Section 7522.30 of PEPRA.

For individualsemployees hired prior to January 1, 2013, including employees hired on or after January 1, 2013 who are classified as or-"classic" members as identified by CalPERS, the District provides the 2.5%@55 retirement formula. The District pays the 8% member contribution on behalf of the employee.

For individualsemployees hired on or after January 1, 2013, or classified as "new members" as identified by CalPERS, the retirement formula is 2%@62. The employee is required to pay

one half of the total normal cost or a minimum amount as required by CalPERS. In 2016, this amount is 6.25% and is subject to change. New members shall contribute from their pensionable compensation an amount equal to 50% of the normal cost attributable to the 2% @62 retirement plan pursuant to Government Code Section 7522.30(c). This amount shall be determined on an annual basis by CalPERS.

The District's CalPERS contract includes shall also provide the following retirement benefitsprovisions:

A. Improved Non-Industrial Disability Allowance (§21427)

B. Pre-Retirement Optional Settlement 2 Death Benefit (§21548)

C. "Final Compensation" — Three Years (§20037)

D. Sick Leave Credit (§ 20965)

1. Military Service Credit as Public Service. Service. Current employees may purchase a maximum of Four (4) years of service credit for any continuous active military or merchant marine service prior to employment with the District. The procedures, process and provisions for Military Service Credit are governed by CalPERS.

 Pre-Retirement Death Benefits. The District provides certain pre-retirement death benefits to beneficiaries enrolled as members of CalPERS if an employee dies prior to retirement. The provisions, process, procedures, etc., are governed by CalPERS.

B.

<mark>1.a</mark> RETIREE MEDICAL BENEFITS

Employees who retire from the District and are retired under CalPERS may receive a retiree medical benefit from the District up to \$1,350 per month (including the statutory minimum) toward the payment of medical premiums for his/her enrollment and any eligible dependents enrollment in a CalPERS provided medical plan.

C.4.a

2. <u>HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS</u>

The District contracts with the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Act (PEMHCA) provided by CalPERS for medical plan enrollment. In the event that the employee selects a health insurance benefit plan through PERS and the monthly premium for such plan is less than the District's monthly contribution level, the District's contribution for that employee shall be the plan premium actually paid. In the event that the monthly premium exceeds the District's maximum monthly contribution level, the employee shall be responsible to pay the additional premium. The District agrees to provide a monthly maximum contribution towards the PERS health insurance plan up to one thousand three hundred fifty dollars (\$1,350.00) per month (this amount includes the PEMHCA statutory minimum).

Except as otherwise provided in PEMHCA with regard to CalPERS medical, the health and welfare benefits provided by the District pursuant to this policy include health and welfare benefits coverage for the spouse and dependents as permitted by the applicable law.

A. Medical Insurance

The District provides medical insurance through <u>CalPERS</u> and will contribute toward the premium cost of medical insurance as follows:

<u>1) PERS Medical Insurance Plans</u>

Effective January 1, 2017 for all non-mou employees, the District's "Maximum Monthly Contribution" for an employee's enrollment in a CalPERS Medical Insurance Plan shall be \$1,350.00. If a medical plan is selected through CalPERS, and the monthly premium is less than the Maximum Monthly Contribution, the District's contribution shall be the actual plan premium due. If the monthly premium exceeds the Maximum Monthly Contribution, the employee shall be responsible for paying the excess premium amount.

CalPERS Medical insurance benefits for retired employees shall be subject to each retired employee's specific length of service with the District. Each retired employee's length of service with the District (excluding any other CalPERS creditable service prior to joining the District) shall determine the type of benefit for which a retired employee is eligible.

The retirement Medical Benefits for Employees hired prior to July1, 2008 and Employees hired on or after July 1, 2008 are as follows:

*Up to the maximum monthly contribution set for the year the employee retires.

For former employees who have retired prior to July 1, 2013 the maximum monthly contribution shall not exceed \$1,190 per month.

2) Medical Insurance Plans Opt-Out Provision

As an alternative option to coverage under the CalPERS Medical Insurance Plans, regular Non-MOU employees shall be entitled to opt-out of District provided medical insurance benefits. For employees who elect to opt out of the District's medical insurance benefit coverage alternatives, the District will pay to the employee monthly \$400.00 in lieu of providing medical insurance benefits. The employee must provide the District with evidence of other group medical insurance coverage in order to opt out of coverage under CalPERS. Employees that elect to opt out may voluntarily elect to have the District make payments directly to the Flexible Spending Arrangement Plan in lieu of payment to the employee in the amounts established by this Resolution and as permitted by law.

Effective January 1, 2017, the District shall contribute \$150 per month to an employee's Health Reimbursement Account plan for qualified additional medical expenses. Effective January 1, 2018, the monthly contribution by the District shall increase to \$200. The monthly contribution shall increase to \$250 on January 1, 2019. This contribution is not available to retirees._ Reimbursements while in office will be permitted so long as participating employees, and his or her dependents, are enrolled in a group health plan sponsored by the District or another employer.

<u>4</u>—___Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA)

The District offers employees participation in Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA) which allow employees to contribute, through voluntary pre-tax payroll deductions, to a Health Care FSA and/or Dependent Care FSA.

B.— Dental Insurance

Employees may select a dental plan from Alternative A or Alternative B as shown on Exhibit "I" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. For those employees selecting Alternative A or B, the District will contribute one hundred percent (100%) of the employee plus dependents' premium.

For retired employees who retire from the District after June 10, 1991 with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of fifty five (55) at the time of retirement, or with thirty (30) years of service and have reached the age of fifty (50) at the time of retirement, or with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of sixty two (62) at the time of retirement, the District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premium for the retiree plus either a spouse or one (1) dependent for the Alternative A plan and 100% of the premium for the retiree plus dependents for Alternative B plan. Except for those identified above, retired employees shall not be eligible for the approved dental plan except on a self-pay basis if provided by the District's dental insurance carrier.

- 1. Regular employees may enroll in a dental plan offered by the District. The District will contribute one hundred percent (100%) of the premium for the employee and all qualified dependents. Employees will be responsible for their own co-pays.
- 2. For retired employees who retire from the District with thirty (30) years of service and have reached the age of fifty (50) at the time of retirement, or with fifteen (15) years of service and have reached the age of fifty-five (55) at the time of retirement, or with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of sixty-two (62) at the time of retirement, the District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premium for the retiree and eligible dependents if the retiree maintains enrollment in a dental plan offered by the District.

3. Except for those persons identified in subparagraph (2) above, retired employees shall not be eligible for the approved dental insurance plan except on a direct self-pay basis as permitted under COBRA.

C. Vision Care

The District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premiums for the employee, employee's spouse and employee's dependents for the vision plan approved by the Board of Harbor Commissioners.

For retired employees who retire from the District after June I, 1991 with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of fifty five (55) at the time of retirement, or with thirty (30) years of service and have reached the age of fifty (50) at the time of retirement, or with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of sixty two (62) at the time of retirement the District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premiums for the retiree, retiree's spouse and retiree's dependents for the vision plan approved by the Board of Harbor Commissioners. Except for those identified above, retired employees shall not be eligible for the approved vision plan except on a self pay basis if provided by the District's vision insurance carrier.

- 1. The District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premiums for the employee, employee's spouse and employee's dependents for the vision plan approved by the Board of Harbor Commissioners.
- 2. For retired employees who retire with thirty (30) years of service and have reached the age of fifty (50) at the time of retirement, or with fifteen (15) years of service and have reached the age of fifty-five (55) at the time of retirement, or with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of sixty-two (62) at the time of retirement, the District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premium for the retiree, retiree's spouse and retiree's dependents for the vision plan approved by the Board of Harbor Commissioners.
- 3. Except for those identified in subparagraph (2) above, retired employees shall not be eligible for the approved vision plan except on a direct self-pay basis as permitted under COBRA.

D. Life Insurance

The District will pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premiums for universal life insurance policies approved by the Board of Harbor Commissioners. There are specific eligibility requirements, the District's insurance carriers may not accept all applicants and, therefore, coverage may not be available.

The face value amounts of the universal life insurance policies for employees shall be equal to 1.5 times the annual salary rounded to the next highest \$10,000. The District's insurance carriers may not accept all applicants and, therefore, coverage may not be available or may be at a lesser denomination or an alternate type of life insurance (e.g. term).

For employees who retire after June 1, 1991, with thirty (30) years of service and have reached the age of fifty (50) at the time of retirement or, with fifteen (15) years of service and have reached the age of fifty-five (55) at the time of retirement or with ten (10) years of service and have reached the age of sixty-two (62) at the time of retirement, the District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premium of the approved life insurance policy in effect at the time they are no longer employed with the District as an employee.

2. Except for those identified above, employees shall not be entitled to have life insurance premiums paid by the District but, if permitted under the insurance policies, may continue the

insurance policies on a self-pay basis.

3. <u>OTHER BENEFITS</u>

The following benefits apply to all regular Non-MOU employees.

A. Sick Leave

Sick leave is a form of employee insurance that is accumulated for use in the event of illness of the employee or of an immediate family member of the employee or to attend doctors' appointments.

Regular full-time employees are granted ninety-six hours of sick leave with pay per fiscal year which shall accrue at a rate of 3.69231 hours per pay period. Regular part-time employees will be granted sick leave in the ratio that such employee's designated hours bear to two thousand eighty (2,080) hours. To the extent allowed by law, all medical and dental time off shall be charged to the individual employee's sick leave balance. Sick leave taken in excess of three-four (34) consecutive working days shall be supported by a verification statement from a medical doctor.

If at any time the District has reason to believe that an employee has abused his/her sick leave benefits, the District may require a certificate signed by a licensed physician or other satisfactory evidence of illness.

The maximum allowable sick leave balance shall be nine hundred (900) hours.

If an employee's annual accrual of sick leave results in a balance in excess of the maximum allowable nine hundred (900) hours as of June 30 in any year, he/she shall receive a cash payment of sixty percent (60%) of his/her hours over the maximum, and his/her sick leave balance shall be reduced to nine hundred (900) hours.

Except for a discharge for cause, a<u>A</u>n employee with five (5) years or more of continuous District service shall have upon retirement the option of receiving a cash payment of sixty percent (605 %) of his/her unused sick leave balance or converting his/her unused sick leave balance to additional CalPERS service credit at the rate of 0.004 year of service credit for each day of unused sick leave (For Example: 250 days of sick leave equals one additional year of service credit). Cash payments shall be computed on the basis of the hourly rate equivalent of the employee's base wage on the last day worked.

A regular full time employee may voluntarily contribute a portion of his/her accrued sick time balance to another employee. Contributions cannot be volunteered that will allow the contributor's total sick time balance to drop below 96 hours in leave balance. Contributions for a specific amount must be submitted in writing to the CEO & Port Director and cannot be rescinded. Contributions will be deducted from a contributing employee's sick time balance when approved. When contributions are approved, the contributing employee will be informed in writing of the specific deduction with the next pay cycle. All employee privacy related to medical conditions will be strictly maintained.

And every day agreed to by the District as the result of a general public holiday signed into law by the President or Governor.

If a paid assigned holiday falls on a Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be the holiday in lieu of the actual holiday. If a paid assigned holiday falls on a Sunday, the following Monday shall be the holiday in lieu of the actual holiday.

Each employee is eligible for three and one half days (3.5) floating holidays per fiscal year which may be taken subject to work schedules and operational requirements. A newly hired employee shall accrue one (1) Floating Holiday per each one hundred twenty (120) days of employment until the end of the fiscal year. In the last pay period of a fiscal year unused floating holiday hours will be placed in the employee' vacation bank.

<u>An employee may carryover no more than three (3) floating holidays to the following year. An employee may only have a maximum bank of six (6) floating holidays at any one time.</u>

C. Vacation

Vacation hours are accrued from the date of hire, are prorated based upon a forty (40) hour work week and 26 pay periods annually. Each anniversary date employees' vacation accrual will be adjusted based upon the table below. Employees must have accrued hours accumulated in order to take vacation. An employee cannot take less than four (4) hours vacation.

Employees shall accrue vacation as follows:

1) Vacation Accumulation

For employees, the total annual accrual shall not exceed the Vacation Days (Hours Accrued) associated with the employees years of service shown in the Table above. All employees shall receive payment from the District for the amount of vacation that has been previously approved but subsequently not granted due to District needs and requirements. In lieu of receiving pay from the District the employee may elect to carry that amount forward in excess of the maximum amount of accrued vacation balance if as a result of the employee being denied said vacation the employee exceeds his/her maximum accrued vacation balance. Any vacation carried forward as a result of being denied by the District must be taken within twelve (12) months or shall be paid by the District.

2) Vacation Balance

The vacation time bank balance shall not be maintained over four hundred (400) hours. When an employee's current annual accrual results in the employee having a balance in excess of four hundred (400) hours, the employee will be paid as of June 30 each year for all excess hours over four hundred (400) hours. This buy down shall not count towards the maximum vacation redemption allowed in (3) below.

3) Vacation Redemption

After five (5) years' service, and upon using eighty (80) hours of vacation during the past twelve (12) months, an employee may request to receive pay in lieu of either forty (40) or eighty (80) hours of vacation accrual at the current hourly wage rate. Such an employee must have a minimum of forty (40) hours of accrued vacation after the payment. Payment in lieu of eighty (80) hours of vacation accrual under this paragraph shall not be made more than once per fiscal year.

4) Payment upon Retirement or Termination

Employees who terminate their employment or are terminated shall be paid the hourly equivalent of their salary for each hour of earned unused vacation carried on the District's records. Payment shall be based upon the salary in effect on the last day actually worked or spent on authorized leave. The hourly equivalent of salary shall be calculated by dividing the employee's annual salary by 2,080 hours.

5)- Vacation Benefits for Part-Time Employees

Regular part-time employees shall be eligible for vacation benefits which accrue on a pro-rata basis utilizing the following formula:

6) Use of Vacation

7)—Vacation time may not be used in lieu of sick leave unless employee has exhausted all his/her sick leave.

8) Time Balances

Each employee's vacation and sick leave balances shall be kept up-to-date and printed on the employee's pay stub.

D. <u>4. BEREAVEMENT LEAVE</u>

In the case of death within the immediate family of an employee, the employee will be granted forty (40) hours of bereavement leave with full pay within ten (10) days from the date of death. Immediate family shall consist of spouse, domestic partner as defined in paragraph 5, parents, grandparents, brothers, sisters, children, grandchildren of the employee or the spouse, or of any other significant person who maintains a spouse-like relationship with the employee.

E. District Administrative Leave Policy No. 12300.4A

Subject to prior approval, the needs of the District and the availability of a qualified replacement, as determined by his/her Supervisor, except as otherwise provided by law an employee may take leave without pay. District Administrative Policy No. 12300.4A, which may be modified from time to time, governs all leaves of absence and establishes guidelines and procedures.

5._____MILITARY LEAVE

A District employee may be granted a military leave of absence as permitted under state and federal law.

F. <u>6. TUITION REIMBURSEMENT</u>

The District shall provide tuition reimbursement to employees for formal education subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The course must relate specifically to the employee's job or assist the employee to prepare for promotion or transfer opportunities within the District.
- 2. The employee shall receive advanced written approval from the CEO & Port Director.
- 3. The course must be taken during off duty hours.
- 4. The employee must receive a passing grade.

If the employee drops the course for non-extenuating circumstances or receives less than a passing grade, he or she will not be eligible for tuition reimbursement.

The reimbursement will cover tuition within the limits prescribed and necessary course material only. The District shall reimburse only the actual costs which shall not exceed the California State University system's schedule. Any additional tuition cost must be borne by the employee.

Course materials paid for by the District either directly or by reimbursement shall become property of the District. This provision may be waived by the District in writing on a case by case basis.

To receive reimbursement, the employee must file a claim within thirty (30) Days of receipt of a passing grade. Reimbursement will be made within thirty (30) days of the submission and approval of the claim.

All employees not covered by the MOU are entitled to an additional 25% above the California State University system schedule and a broader selection of course work.

G. 7. MILITARY SERVICE CREDIT AS PUBLIC SERVICE

Current employees may purchase a maximum of four (4) years of service credit for any continuous active military or merchant marine service prior to employment with the District.

Eligible individuals electing to purchase this benefit must contribute an amount equal to the contribution for current and prior service that they and the District would have made with respect to that period of service. (Individuals electing this option must pay the District's contribution based on the District's rate in effect at the time a decision is made to purchase this service credit.) Costs will be calculated by CalPERS<u>CalPERS</u> based upon the District's contribution rate at the time that this benefit is selected, and the eligible individual's rate at the first period of service with the District after military service. Interest will be added to the costs from the date of hire to the date the purchase of the optional benefit is made.

Eligible individuals choosing to purchase service credit for prior military or merchant marine service must submit supporting documentation. The supporting documentation and a completed CalPERS<u>CalPERS</u> Cost Calculation form must be submitted to CalPERS<u>CalPERS</u> in order to obtain an estimate of costs. Military service credit cannot be purchased if an individual has:

- (a) Received a dishonorable discharge
- (b) Actively served for 20 years of more in the military, or
- (c) Received military service credit from any other retirement system.

Individuals may purchase this service credit by making a lump sum payment or by making monthly payments over a period of time not to exceed 96 months. Also, the option exists of making a partial lump sum payment with monthly installments for the remaining balance. Bi weekly payments can be made on a pre tax payroll deduction basis or on an after tax payroll deduction basis. The selection of pre tax payroll deductions is irrevocable.

Current employees may purchase a maximum of Four (4) years of service credit for any continuous

The procedures, process and provisions for Military Service Credit are governed by CalPERS.

8. EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (EAP)

H.

Active employees are eligible to participate in the District arranged Employee Assistance Program (EAP). The Employee Assistance Program (EAP) makes available confidential, professional assistance to participants and their families by providing assessments of treatment needs, brief counseling, referrals to appropriate types of treatments, interface with external sources and appropriate follow- ups. Participation in the EAP is voluntary. There are no costs to the employee for services provided by the EAP, including short term counseling and up to three (3) face to face visits with an EAP network counselor related to a similar concern. However, if an additional referral is necessary, the employee will be responsible for all expenses if they are not covered by the employee's medical insurance plan(s).

The District will have no information about an employee's participation in the EAP without the employee's written permission except as required by law. Legally required exceptions include threat or harm to oneself or another.

9. SUPPLEMENTAL INSURANCE PROGRAMS

I.

Active employees are eligible to participate in a District arranged Voluntary Supplemental Insurance Program. The supplemental insurance program is designed to help supplement primary health plans by providing directly to participating individuals cash benefits, unless they choose otherwise, to cover expenses such as deductibles, out- of-pocket expenses and loss of earning power.

Participation in any of the supplemental insurance plans is voluntary and solely paid by the participating employee. Individuals can purchase supplemental insurance on a pre-tax payroll deduction basis. Premium rates are based on the type of coverage selected. Many of the plans pay wellness benefits to the policyholder and their families.

J.--<u>10.</u>--<u>DEFERRED COMPENSATION PROGRAMS</u>

The District arranges for the availability of deferred compensation programs that are intended to provide retirement savings options with special tax advantages that allow employees to save and invest for retirement on a tax-deferred basis. These programs offer a wide range of investment options and allow employees to choose which options are best suited for them in order to achieve their desired investment mix.

Participation in these programs is voluntary, and the District does not participate in any form of matching.

Employees who are participating in the CalPERS 457 Deferred Compensation Program will be eligible to take loans from their accounts.

11. CalPERS PRE-RETIREMENT DEATH BENEFITS

The District provides certain pre-retirement death benefits to beneficiaries enrolled as members of CalPERS if an employee dies prior to retirement. The spouse of a deceased employee who was eligible to obtain a service retirement may elect to receive the Pre-Retirement Optional Settlement 2 Death Benefit in lieu of the lump sum Basic Death Benefit. If the employee's spouse was married to the employee either before the occurrence of the injury or the onset of the illness that resulted in the employees death or for at least one (I) year before the employee's death the surviving spouse

C.4.a

will be eligible to receive a monthly allowance equal to the amount the employee would have received if the employee retired for service on the date of his/her death and had elected the CalPERS retirement option providing the highest monthly allowance an employee can leave a spouse. The benefit is payable to the deceased employee's spouse until the spouse's death. Upon the death of the employee's spouse the benefit will continue to the employee's natural or adopted unmarried children under age 18. The provisions, process, procedures, etc., are governed by CalPERS.

L. <u>121.</u> <u>-CONTINUATION OF MEDICAL INSURANCE BENEFIT COVERAGE FOR</u> SURVIVORS (PRE-RETIREMENT DEATH)

An additional District pre-retirement death benefit is made available to the surviving spouse upon the death of an employee who was eligible to retire at age fifty (50) or over with a minimum of five (5) years of service. This benefit is only related to medical insurance premiums and is only based on an employee's length of service with the District. The additional pre-retirement death benefit is as follows:

*District paid percentage of medical insurance premium is subject to the maximum monthly contribution the amount of which is fixed at the date of retirement or death.

M. <u>132. ADDITIONAL POST-RETIREMENT DEATH BENEFITS FOR SURVIVING</u> <u>SPOUSE</u>

Premiums for medical, up to the Maximum Monthly Contribution shall be fixed at the date of retirement or death, and premiums for dental and vision benefits continue to be paid for the surviving spouse and dependents of an employee for whom such payments are made under this policy who has retired or is eligible to retire, whether having retired or not. This provision applies to premiums paid under a CalPERS Medical Insurance Plan. District paid percentage of medical insurance premium, determined in accordance with the preceding table, is subject to the maximum monthly contribution. For example, and by way of illustration only, if an employee covered by a CalPERS Medical Plan which also covers his spouse, is hired prior to July 1, 2008, has eight (8) years of service with the District, and not retired, but dies, the District will continue to pay eighty percent (80%) of the premium for the Plan coverage for medical, up to the maximum monthly contribution fixed at the date of death plus dental and vision benefits for the surviving spouse as noted above.

3. <u>143. VESTED RIGHTS</u>

Nothing in this Resolution shall be deemed to alter or change the rights to health and welfare benefits for <u>non-MOU</u> employees, retired employees, whose rights to such benefits have vested prior to the adoption of this Resolution.

4. <u>14DEFINITIONS. DEFINITIONS</u>

Subject to any specific definitions to the contrary imposed by any insurance, retirement or other policy or contract for employee benefits, the following definitions are adopted:

CHILD: Includes a biological, adopted, or foster child, a stepchild, a legal ward, a child of a domestic partner or a child who is either under age 18, or an adult dependent child.

SPOUSE: Defined in accordance with applicable state law, including common law marriage and registered domestic partner.

PARENT: Includes biological, foster, or adoptive parent, a step-parent, or legal guardian.

DOMESTIC PARTNER: Means person of the same or opposite gender who either can provide documentation of registration of the Domestic Partner relationship pursuant to a state, county or municipal provision, or can meet the following qualifications:

- 1) Have resided with each other continuously for at least the past 12 months in a solepartner relationship that is intended to be permanent;
- 2) Are not married to any other person;
- 3) Are at least 18 years old;
- 4) Are not related to each other by blood closer than would bar marriage per state law; and
- 5) Are financially interdependent as can be documented by copies of joint home ownership or lease, common bank accounts, credit cards, investments, or insurance.

5. <u>EFFECTIVE DATEEFFECTIVE DATE</u>

This Resolution shall become effective February 1July 1, 2017 upon its adoption and shall supersede Resolution No. 11161166, as amended

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF HARBOR COMMISSIONERS OF THE OXNARD HARBOR DISTRICT FIXING THE EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTION AT AN EQUAL AMOUNT FOR EMPLOYEES AND ANNUITANTS UNDER THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES MEDICAL AND HOSPITAL CARE ACT

WHEREAS, **Oxnard Harbor District** is a contracting agency under Government code Section 22920 and subject to the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 22892 (a) provides that a contracting agency subject to Act shall fix the amount of the employer contribution by resolution; and

WHEREAS, Government code Section 22892 (b) provides that the employer contribution shall be an equal amount for both employees and annuitants, but may not be less than the amount prescribed by Section 22892 (b) of the Act; and

RESOLVED, That the employer contribution for each employee or annuitant shall be the amount necessary to pay the full cost of his/her enrollment, including the enrollment of family members, in a health benefits plan up to a maximum of **\$1,350.00** per month, plus administrative fees and Contingency Reserve Fund assessments, and be it further

RESOLVED, **Oxnard Harbor District** has fully complied with any and all applicable provisions of Government Code Section 7507 in electing the benefits set forth above; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the participation of the employees and annuitants of **Oxnard Harbor District** shall be subject to determination of its status as an "agency or instrumentality of the state or political subdivision of a State" that is eligible to participate in a governmental plan within the meaning of Section 414 (d) of the Internal Revenue Code, upon publication of final Regulations pursuant to such Section. If it is determined that **Oxnard Harbor District** would not qualify as an agency or instrumentality of the state or political subdivision of a State under such final Regulations, CalPERS may be obligated, and reserves the right to terminate the health coverage of all participants of the employer.

RESOLVED, That the executive body appoint and direct, and it does hereby appoint and direct, Deputy Executive Director, CAO/CFO to file with the Board a verified copy of this resolution, and to perform on behalf of **Oxnard Harbor District** all functions required of it under the Act.

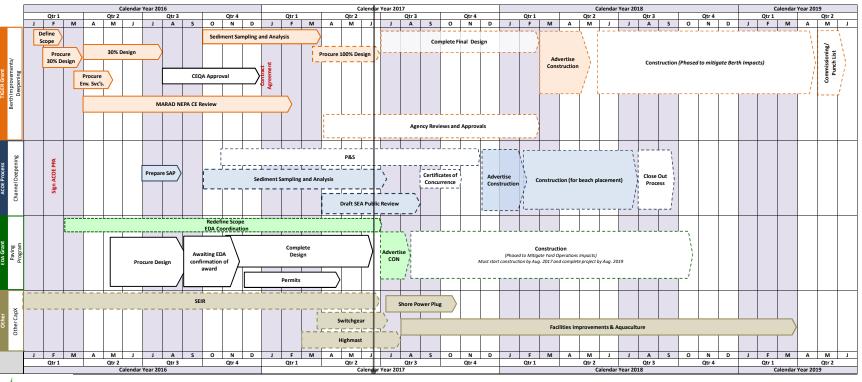

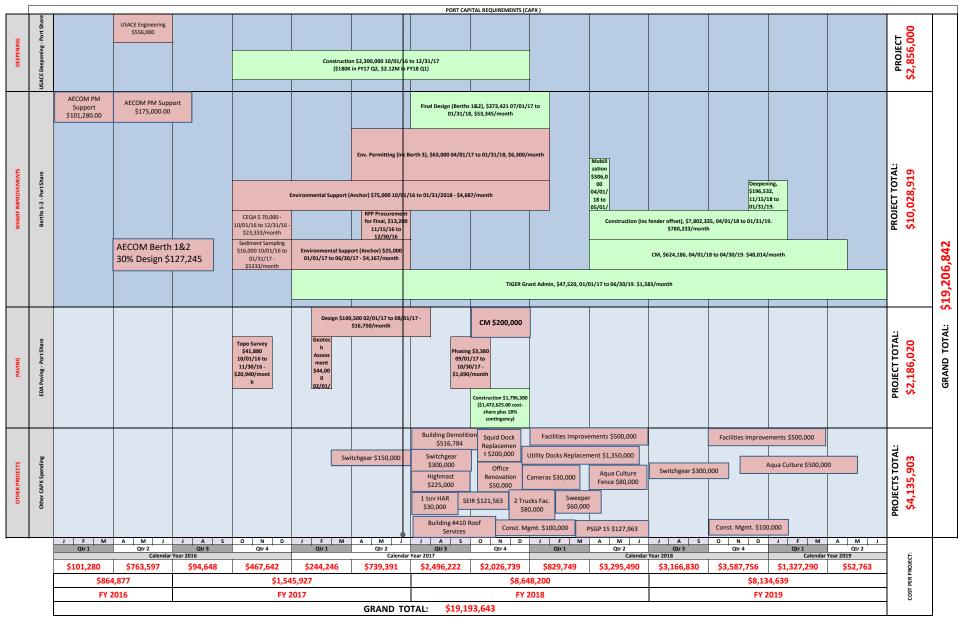

The addition of the shore power system on Wharf-2 is necessary to ensure the Tug Boats are readily available to support District's various customers, and it also provides the operational flexibility for the Tug Boats to dock in multiple locations without compromising its onboard electronic system due to lack of shore side power.

The scope of services include:

- Obtain existing site utility drawings to compare with the existing site conditions;
- Evaluate the existing Southern California Edison system to determine the most appropriate method to service the Tug Boat;

Agenda Specifics

The second phase of this project will fully build out the remainder of the Port's high mast lights to be replaced with more efficient LED fixtures. The original pilot project solution proved to perform as designed and URSA (previously Starlite) has conducted additional simulation results throughout the Port. The simulation provides improved light distribution and uniformity and increased light levels while using less wattage per fixture.

Project Profile

On August 8, 2016 the Board approved the purchase and installation of high mast fixtures for four poles on the south terminal as a pilot test before moving forward with the remainder of the project. This pilot test has proven to be successful and has enhanced the safety and security of the Port. We are looking to replace nearly 140 1000W HPS fixtures with 480W LED fixtures. The proposed energy savings is nearly 52% after installation.

This is the second phase of the high mast lighting retrofit project. A notice of Exemption has been prepared in accordance with State CEQA Guidelines §15061(b)(3) (not a project) and §15301 (existing facilities).

The Great White Fleet, turned blue, gets upgraded

Chiquita Brands International's shipping arm takes delivery of two vessels, bought from Germany, after refit and cold ironing provision



During the event called MAST Marine Advanced System & Technology Open House & Technology Expo 2017, Stefano Di Paolo, Great White Fleet (GWF) President, presented in Hueneme Port Authority the improvements on service as from January 2017 regarding last technological and security vessel improvements within liner shipping between Guatemala, Mexico and California.

The Port of Hueneme in California, located in Ventura County on the Santa Barbara Channel, is the only deep water harbor between Los Angeles and the San Francisco Bay area.

Oxnard Harbor District has recognized GWF for environmental stewardship on the new Chiquita vessels calling the Port of Hueneme and delivering a commemorative plague to Chiquita Progress' master.

GWF takes care of Chiquita product transportation Northbound and act as carrier for liner cargo in Europe and United States using own chartered reefer ships.

The two vessels employed in the liner service schedule – Chiquita Progress and Chiquita Ventura – have been provided with latest modern high voltage shore connection named Cold Ironing System, that grants a green on shore electricity power to the vessel as requested by California ports regulation to diminish environmental impact, in full alignment with Chiquita environment requirements for the full supply chain from farm to market, as shown in the latest Sustainability Report recently launched; in addition, Chiquita import companies are C-CTAP certificated and the carrier is in progress of doing the same procedure.

Chiquita Brands International grows, procures, markets, and sells bananas and other fresh fruits under the famous Chiquita name and others. Chiquita is a privately held, leading global company with 18,000 employees across 25 countries being present in nearly 70 countries (make sure to cross-check version. Your previous attachment did not have this info updated), mainly in North America and Europe, that has been taken over by the Brazilian juice giant Cutrale-Safra in 2014.

In December 2016 Chiquita Brands International purchased a pair of Conti Reederei vessels to modernize its fleet of reefer containerships, the 2,127-teu Conti Arabella and Conti Salome (both built 2007 at German Aker Ostsee shipyard, located in Wismar), then renamed Chiquita Progress and Chiquita Venture, , carrying the Liberian flag, both fitted with 400 reefer plugs each for 40' containers and with 3 cranes of 45 tonnes, operated by Chiquita's shipping arm GWF between Central America and the US.

The US fruit company went on the second hand market for second time in a year to bolster its fleet, having bought two sisterships of 2,500 TEUs in late 2015 from German operator NSC Schiffahrt; the Coral Bay and Crystal Bay, each fitted with 566 reefer plugs for 40', have currently the names of Chiquita Express and Chiquita Trader, and are operated by GWF on the same Central American-US trades.

Notably just after its take over from the current Brazilian stakeholders three years ago, Chiquita announced to get back its shipping operations to port of New Orleans after four-decade absence, when the company was known as United Brands and then relocated its shipping operations from the Louisiana port to Gulfport.

Founded in 1907 and being based in Cincinnati, Ohio, Great White Fleet Ltd. operates as a subsidiary of Chiquita Brands International Inc., headquartered in Charlotte, Nort Carolina, which employs some 20,000 people across 70 countries. The cargo carrier is in essence Chiquita's logistics arm and provides freight transportation services for cargo shippers to and from Central America, handling dry and refrigerated containerized cargo as well as providing integrated trucking and ocean services. Interesting is the story of the hull colour; when President Teddy Roosevelt sent

a fleet of warships on a worldwide tour these ships were painted white instead of the now customary grey and became known as the Great White Fleet.

At the same time, Captain Baker, boss of United Fruit Company, also painted ships white to reflect the tropical sunlight and allow banana temperatures to be more easily maintained. As the fleet of big, fast, white-painted reefer vessels grew, they too became known as the Great White Fleet. Now the latest ships acquired on property by GFW feature a blue hull to reflect the company's colors.

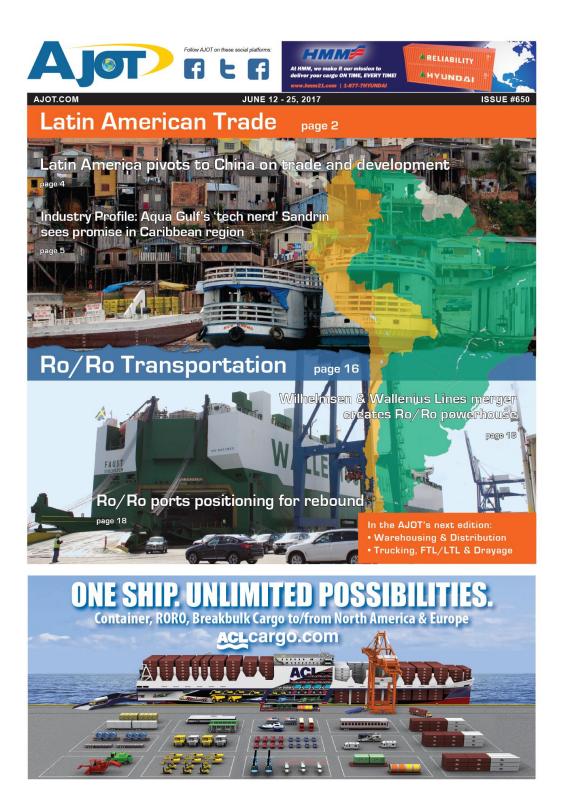

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Ro/Ro ports positioning for rebound Flexibility: the ro/ro calling card

The ro/ro sector has been flat reflecting a listless global auto market. But there are signs that business could be improving very soon and the ro/ro ports are trying to get in front of the market.

North America has an impressive array of large, ro/ ro facilities, some based in well-known hub port areas like New York/New Jersey and the San Pedro ports of LA and Long Beach. Others are located in lesser recognized port regions such as the Port of Davisville in Rhode Island or the Port of Hueneme, California.

One thing the ro/ro ports. large and small, share is they are often treated as a bit of a sideshow to the box business While it is certainly an unfair rendering of the most versatile of seaborne services, it's true nonetheless.

While some of the rationale of this oversight is the ubiquitous nature of the box. another is purely business. Simply, the OEM side of the ro/ro business has been flat for a long time. After a pre-recession crest in 2008 of 21.3 million seaborne vehicles shipments, according to London-based analysts Clarkson's, the annual growth between 2013-2015 has been a tepid 1.4% with the tally yet to crack the 20-million-unit threshold. And this year [2017] looks to be no better. But a ro/ro sector rebound

might be coming soon fed by more vehicle movements and project and breakbulk freight (see Matt Miller's story on Whilhelmsen-Wallenius merger for comments on the potential for break bulk and project freight on page 16). and ports are trying to get in front of the trend.

No place is this more evi-dent than the Port of Davisville Rhode Island, one of the largest, (if not well-known outside the sector) ro/ro ports in North America.

In November 2016, Rhode Island voters approved "Ques-tion 5", a \$50 million bond measure for infrastructure projects at the Port of Davisville.

With question 5 in the rearview mirror, the port embarked on the \$90 million modernization plan for Pier 2. Pier 2 is central to the modernization plan for the Port of Davisville, Pier 2 is an earth filled cofferdam cell structure built by the US Navy in 1956. It was designed to last 50 years, a period that has come and gone. The pier is the primary facility in the Port of Davisville and due to its style of construc-tion [earth filled rather than timber supported], it is the pier best suited to handling heavy "deck" project cargo. In addition, the pier is the easiest to expand into another

berth allowing multiple vessels to berth simultaneously. Also, the increased size will enable the port to handle the new generation of Pure Car Carriers (PCC).

Besides the Bond Ques-tion and Pier 2 mentioned above, there has been significant recent investment made in the facilities. Back in June 2016, the port announced an investment of \$1.25 million in paving and stripping Terminal 5, which covers over 13-acres, to provide more capacity and operational flexibility, particularly on days when two ships are in port. Another port investment was to support a project

that involved installing new marine hardware to allow the port to more fully utilize Terminals 4 and 5.

Port of Davisville is in the top ten in vehicle handling in the US. Unlike many North American ports, the rol ro business is the main calling card and it has been an ace. In 2016, a record breaking 214,350 vehicles arrived by sea and another 40,870 by rail and truck. NORAD, the port's auto processor the port's auto processor, handled 258,740 vehicles and another 305 metric tons of project cargo (principally wind) in 2016. (REBOUND - continued on

These ECL ships are bound for such destinations as Vietnam, Myanmar and Indonesia. The ECL ships also dock in Vladivostok, Malaysia, the Philippines, Hong Kong and various ports in China.

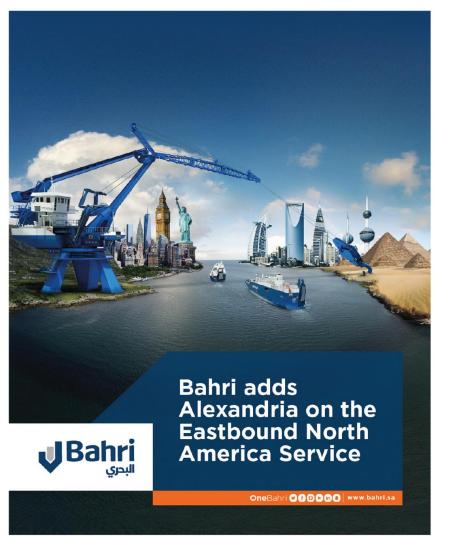

PORT OF PHILADELPHIA INVESTS IN VEHICLE TERMINAL

Another indication that ports are trying to get out in front of a ro/ro rebound is Pennsylvania's investment in the Port of Philadelphia's vehicle terminal.

The State is investing \$93 million in the Port of Philadelphia's ro/ro facilities, which will then double annual import capacity from around 160,000 units to around 350,000 vehicles. The investment is part of an overall \$300 million government investment at the port through to 2020.

The port authority said part of the funding would see a former seaplane hangar converted into a second vehicle processing center for Hyundai-Kia, along with the addition of 155 acres for vehicle storage and handling at the former Navy Yard. State investment will be supported by private investment in the vehicle handling facilities at the port. Philadelphia currently handles around 160,000 imported vehicles per year for the Korean carmaker, with services provided by Glovis America. No vehicles are currently exported. It first started handling Hyundai-Kia volumes back in 2010 when the carmaker switched imports there from the ports of New York and New Jersey, and Baltimore. Up until now, vehicle volumes have been unloaded at the Packer

Up until now, vehicle volumes have been unloaded at the Packer Avenue Marine container terminal and moved to a vehicle handling facility at Pier 98. The conversion of the Navy Yard will mean vehicles can be directly unloaded onto a dedicated auto handling facility. The Port of Philadelphia's ro/ro services include weekly Eukor calls from Busan in Korea and Veracruz in Mexico.

PORT OF HUENEME: GOING 40 FEET

In February 2017, the Port of Hueneme entered into a Project Partnership Agreement (PPA) with the United States Army Corps of Engineers to deepen the Port's general navigation areas to 40-feet Mean Lower Low Water. The dredging project which has been in the works for a couple of years is key to the Port's goal of handling the larger post-Panamax ro/ro vessels (The port handled its first post Panamax ship last year.)

According to the documents, the proposed project's berth deepening effort "would include dredging activities to deepen Berths 1 and 2 along Wharf 1 to approximately -40 feet MLLW, to provide deep draft vessel continuity from the harbor, through the channel and to Berths 1 and 2 along Wharf 1. Through implementation of the project, vessels would no longer need to wait for higher tide to transit the channel and come to berth, increasing operational efficiencies." The Port of Hueneme is a niche

port handling perishables and ro/ro cargo. in 2016 at the Port of Hueneme, automobile imports totaled approximately 300,168 tons. In 2016 over 300,000 autos were imported and 37,873 autos were exported through the Port of Hueneme, a record high year for vehicle imports and exports. For the same period, fruit and vegetable imports stood at over 108,000 tons and liquid bulk fertilizer hit 160,145 tons. Overall, cargo increased by 10.6% to 1,574,903 tons, a new record at the Port.

Port of San Diego Plans for More Ro/Ro

In December of 2016, the Port of San Diego commissioners voted unanimously to remove two warehouses on the Tenth Avenue Terminal. One of the biggest beneficiaries of the new plan was the port's robust ro/ro business. Under the plan, multipurpose general cargo (ro/ro) would rise the most, from 85,131 metric tons to 733,050 metric tons. The Port's ro/ ro sector already handles in excess of 400.000 vehicles annually.

ro sector already handles in excess of 400,000 vehicles annually. According to the report: "The plan provides a long-term road map for the terminal, outlining key cargo business markets. Certification allows construction on phase 1 of the Plan to begin in 2017. This plan is anticipated to increase the terminal's cargo capacity, create jobs and implement clean technology to reduce pollution."

The first phase of the terminal's new master plan, costing \$24 million, includes the demolition of transit sheds 1 and 2 on the west side of the 96-acre terminal, a new area for temporary equipment storage and the completion of several rail improvements. Future phases would include: • a 100,000-square-foot dry-bulk storage container

 and five new 270-foot gantry cranes.

The terminal improvements are projected to increase cargo from 1 million metric tons in 2014 to 4.7 million metric tons by 2035. An earlier projection showed an increase to 6.2 million metric tons.

Construction on Phase 1 is anticipated to begin by summer 2017 and is anticipated to take 33 months. Phase 1 will entail \$24 million in Port and federal investment, which includes a \$10 million TIGER erant.

Ro/Ro terminal development in the wake of neo-panamax container vessel mania

For many ports, diversity is critical, and one of the most diversified cargo segments, roll-on/roll-off, does not show any signs of rolling over (no pun intended) to the newest mega container vessel mania. The ro/ro form of ocean transport continues to offer an important resource for cargo handling at North America's seaports, offering the capability to handle a variety of cargo such as import and export automobiles, large construction and farm machinery and oversized crated equipment. The key is that the scope of roll-on/roll-off, utilizing a variety of vessel styles and handling equipment, presents options that can expand a port's versatility without extraordinary infra-structure development costs.

It has been well established that containerization is the single most publicized style of waterborne cargo carriage in the world. Steamship lines have recently expanded container vessel capacities, anticipating increases in cargo demand. At the same time, expansion of the Panama Canal to accept the new container vessels has in turn heralded an opportunity for new port facility growth. Until recently, the majority of the containerized cargo



carried by these new vessels has been directed to West Coast ports. At the same time, publicity sur-

At the same time, puonicity surrounding the new-found flexibility of the Panama Canal was a signal to East Coast and Gulf ports to ramp up to prepare to welcome the newest class of container vessels. As a result, many of these ports have been hard at it, anticipating a catch-up response to the larger vessels appearing on the West Coast. The completion of the canal widening has gained momentum at East Coast and Gulf ports and some of the newest vessels have already called at the Ports of Savannah, Georgia and Houston.

As the nation's seaports consider their chance of attaining a position in a container service using the newest super post panamax vessels, many ro/ ro users must hope that they will avoid this temptation. The requirements for expanded container service including larger land mass, deeper channels, multiple dockside cranes, additional land based container handling capability and expanded inland access whether rail or truck, will potentially be committed and lost for other valuable cargoes. District is working closely with port tenant, Pasha, to accommodate both international and Hawaii volumes, and proactively manage business growth. These efforts include recent inducement-calls at NCMT of Pasha's newest vessel, Marjorie C, which typically calls in Los Angeles."

PORT OF PORTLAND, OREGON RO/ RO BUSINESS BRIGHT SPOT

On March 31, 2017 ICTSI Oregon, Inc. and the Port of Portland mutually agreed to terminate a 25-year lease agreement to operate the container facility at the Port's Terminal 6. But the bad box news was mitigated by the good news on the ro/ro sector.

In 2016, more than 50,000 export autos were handled at Portland, the largest total on the U.S. West Coast. What's more impressive is the total of auto imports and exports. Combined vehicle handling hit 291,000 units, an 11% increase over 2015. "With our proximity to Asia, Portland has become a leading auto distribution hub...We've seen significant growth in exports since 2012 and expect that positive trend to continue in 2017," Keith Leavitt, chief commercial officer said.

The Port of Portland and Auto Warehousing Company received a state funding grant for \$7 million expansion of the auto facilities in Rivergate Industrial District near Terminal 6. The plans are for AWC's development of a new 18.9-acre storage and staging yard

to support export vehicles.

SAN FRANCISCO IMPROVEMENTS PAVE THE WAY FOR MORE RO/RO San Francisco is beginning to roll. Part of the reason for the improvement is decisions made by the Port Authority over the last few years are beginning to fulfill their promise. At the top of the list is Pier 80.

Pier 80 is the port's principal cargo terminal, a 60-acre facility with two warehouses and four deepwater berths. The facility had been in a downward spiral since the Great Recession of 2008, but the location has always held great promise. Last August things began to turn around as Pasha, a major auto handling group, took over the operations of Pier 80 after inking a 15-year lease with the Port Authority. Almost immediately the facility began filling with autos, both on the import and export side of the ledger. While the ships are calling, it is

a \$10 million work in progress as the Pier shifts from being an emergency homeless shelter to a hub ro/ro port of call for Pasha's vehicle customers in the Bay Area. Part of the attraction of the Pier 80 deal for Pasha was the underutilization when compared to other West Coast auto ports like Benicia and Richmond which are already operating near capacity. Ports like San Diego are expanding their ro/ro facilities in anticipation of an increase in auto imports over the next decade. Pasha believes that when Pier 80 is completely renovated, it will be able (*REBOUND - continued on page 25*) (MANIA – continued from page 22) ports have continued business as usual including plans to move ahead with container facility modernization. The key question, however, might well be what the impact will be if these resources are not available when ports have the opportunity to create facilities and services necessary to sustain other forms of ocean-borne cargo?

Multi-cargo Approach

The benefits of a commitment to ro/ro cargoes can be significant and in truth, many ports have found a way to accommodate a multi-cargo approach. As a prime example, over four decades ago, a combination of ro/ ro cargo and container handling provided an excellent opportunity for the Port of Baltimore. Baltimore's proximity to the Midwest created a special interest for shippers of not only containers, but ro/ro cargo as well. Import and export automobiles and farm and construction machines were primed to move via the Port.

Beginning in late 1960's and early 1970's, Atlantic Container Line (ACL) called at Baltimore's Dundalk Marine Terminal. The plan was to begin an effort to provide a combination of container handling and roll-on/roll-off cargo using the same vessel. Baltimore's Midwest connection was critical and as a signature port for roll-on/roll-off cargo today, Baltimore offers service to a number of specialty ocean carriers handling expanded ro/ro cargo volumes.

Originally, automobiles, construction and agricultural machines, large crated cargo, both import and export, were lifted by ships gear or dockside cranes to and from the hold of standard cargo vessels. ACL's combination vessels were designed to handle a variety of cargo in many forms. A great deal of ACL's ro/ro cargo, as example, was easily loaded while containers were lifted to and from the vessel's cells by container gantry cranes. Autos and trucks were driven on and off at the same time by longshoremen. Larger pieces, however, offered a challenge depending upon the size and stevedoring equipment available to handle it. Over the years, the flow of ro/

ro cargo to Baltimore increased significantly. Import and export automobiles, vans and trucks moved in and out of the port on car carriers and flatbed trucks. The early requirements for ro/ro cargo was a pier to accept a ramp, land to park the cargo and motive power to move it into and out of the vessel and on and off heavy haulers and rail flat cars. Eventu ally, the demand to handle this cargo efficiently led to the development of specialty equipment. Leaning upon ACL's unique combination, the cre-ation of vessels with drive-on/drive off capability led to increasingly more efficient loading and unloading systems. This included utilizing a combination of terminal handling equipment specifically designed to easily carry cargo on or off of the vessel directly

One of the most significant developments in ro/ro operations occurred in the late 1960's. The start-up of Atlantic (MANIA – continued on page 25)

and around 100 ships. But there is another intrigu-But there is another intrigu-ing aspect to the facility revi-talization. One of the first big export items was Teslas - per-haps the most recognizable brand name in the electric pow-ered automotive sector. The Port of San Francisco is the closest port to the auto manufacturing facility in Fremont and hopes to become the primary export gateway for their vehicles - an important balance to an industry

important balance to an industry heavy on imports. An important, related proj-ect to Pier 80 renovation is rail track improvement. Back in 2011, the Port of San Francisco 2011, the Port of San Francisco was awarded a \$2.9 million grant from the US Department of Transportation's Federal Rail Administration (FRA) to rebuild Quint Street Lead, the connec-Quant Street Lead, the connec-tor track from the main line to the Port. The upgraded track enables heavier locomotives and large unit trains to come directly to the Port instead of stopping off in South San Francisco to

off in South San Francisco to switch out to smaller trains. On January 12, 2017, the Port Commission approved a five-year lease extension for San Francisco Bay Railroad. SFBR invested \$1.3 million dollars for 0.000 fract forum tender the articl 4.000 feet of new track in the rail

4,000 feet of new track in the rail yard. This replaces some of the track that was lost to Pier 80 due to the Pasha facility, and addi-tionally helps stage trains needed for the Warriors Arena project. With a grant received from the Bay Area Air Quality Man-agement District (BAAQMD) and the US Environmental Pro-tection Agency (EPA), the Port replaced an old locomotive to a newer and cleaner 90% cleaner locomotive. In a related move on locomotive. In a related move on locomotive. In a related move on January 5th, Caltrain announced Union Pacific would turn over their freight rail rights to Cal-train for the San Francisco-San Jose corridor and in turn Cal-train will hire a shortline operator. The operator will take over interchanging with the Port and all other freight and rail stake-holders on the Peninsula.

ROLLING STOCK The requirement to quickly

discharge and load larger cargo such as rolling stock, construc-tion machines and agricultural equipment created the need for equipment created the need for specially designed conveyance, capable of remaining with the vessel if necessary. Based upon the concept that the trailers could remain aboard the vessel with their cargo if necessary, a small German manufacturer responded with the develop-ment of what now are univer-sally referred to as roll trailers or MAFIs. Today, various versions of these trailers adopted to the of these trailers adapted to the cargo requirements are regularly utilized The first developer and manufacturer of these specialty

type trailers was a company named MAFI, an acronym comnamed MAH, an acronym com-bining the initials of one of the founders. MAFI developed and manufactured what is now referred to as the roll trailer system. Their concept included a special attachment, a "goose neck", leading from the yard tractor's fifth wheel to a special aperture on their trailer.

The MAFI system was spe-cially designed to handle large, over-sized objects such as high and wide crates, containers, vehicles, boats, rail cars, heavy vehicles, boats, rail cars, heavy agricultural implements and large generators. The trailers were designed to be easy loaded and discharged. The system was relatively simple, the "goose neck" attached easily "goose neck" attached easily to the yard tractor's fifth wheel at one end and into an aperture at the front of the roll trailer on the other. The MAFI was a low-slung trailer with a heavy wooden decking and small, multiple tired bogies. The company, MAFI, was founded in 1957. Their concept revo-lutionized the handling of just about everything that was set to sail on an ACL or standard ro/ ro vessel. The cargo handled on MAFIs includes oversized, heavy objects. MAFI has been supplying roll trailers and other ro/ro tools to the industry since ro/ro tools to the industry since the early 1960's. Since that time, the acronym "MAFI" has become synonymous for not

only MAFI's products, but roll trailers manufactured by three

other companies. Most roll trailers including Most roll trailers including those from two other manufac-turers, Novatech in Denmark and Buiscar in Holland, can be purchased or leased from rep-resentatives in the USA. New Jersey company, Martee Inter-national, representing manu-facturers opened a division to sell or lease roll trailers and goose necks. Martee repre-sented Novatech. Martee sold its inventory and customer list to container leasing giant, Triton International. Fleets of (Novat-ech) roll trailers through Triton, Buiscar or MAFI independently, can be found at some of the largcan be found at some of the largest ports in the world.

Port Hueneme, CA – The Port of Hueneme hosted its fourth consecutive Maritime Advanced Systems and Technology Expo, an event that added an important highlight on Port clean air technologies. The MAST Lab/incubator concept was established under the leadership of the Port with the support and partnership of the Center for Threat Management and the Economic Development Collaborative of Ventura County (EDC-VC) as a cooperative research and development program. 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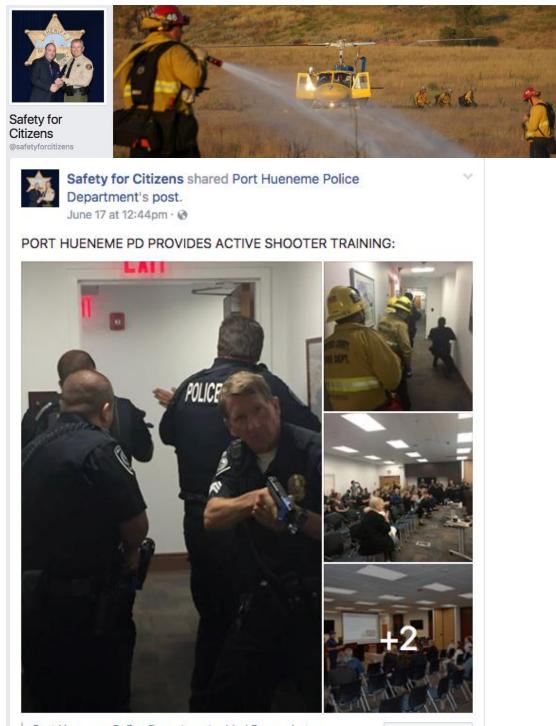

In order to secure additional auto business from Glovis America, Inc. (the successor to Global Auto Processing Services, Inc., "GAPS") to the Port of Hueneme and for that volume to utilize the Oxnard Harbor District's Ventura County Railway Company, operated under contract by Genesee and Wyoming Inc., the District would like to update its agreement with GAPS in the following way:

GAPS merged with Glovis America, Inc. in July 2015, as evidenced by that certain Certificate of Ownership filed with the California Secretary of State on July 29, 2015 (a copy of which is attached to this staff report). The amended terminal agreement would acknowledge the merger and the new signer on behalf of Glovis America, Inc., its CEO, Glenn Clift.

The modification will establish a new special wharfage rate for automobiles delivered to inland destinations by rail of \$15.50/auto-starting March 15th 2017 and continuing through May 15th, 2018.

Project Profile

The Oxnard Harbor District's contract with GAPS/ GLOVIS America, Inc. is currently set to expire on January 31st, 2019, and it has one option to extend after that for 5 years until January 2024.

The current rate for automobiles delivered to inland destinations by rail is \$20.00 per automobile and revenue sharing applies to it. The new rate of \$15.50 will not be part of the revenue sharing calculation.

The criteria that needs to be met for such rate to apply is the following:

-automobiles are unloaded at the wharves of District

-automobiles use GAPS/ leased premises as a first point of rest

-automobiles are loaded on railcars for delivery to the main line railroad by Ventura County Railroad Company.

Operational Impact

This modification to the agreement enhances operations and cargo movement by further utilizing Glovis leased property as first point of rest as well as moving the cargo inland via rail. The additional volume has minimal impact to current port operations, but increases revenue.

Fiscal Impact

- Signatory Change: The signatory party to be updated to be the CEO of GLOVIS America, Inc. Glenn Clift.
- The wharfage rate for automobiles delivered to inland destinations by rail to be changed to a special rate of \$15.50 for a term 14 months, effective March 15th, 2017, expiring on May 15th 2018.
- 4. The special \$15.50 wharfage rate revenues collected by the District on automobiles delivered to inland destinations by rail will not be counted towards revenues collected for revenue sharing with GLOVIS America, Inc. under paragraph 19 for the term of the special rate.
- 5. Other Terms of the Agreement. Except as modified by this Modification No. 6, the remaining provisions of the Terminal Agreement as heretofore modified by Modifications 1-5, remain in full forces and effect and unmodified.
